Adult learners, in particular, are often negatively affected by stress due to conflicting demands of work, academic requirements, and family responsibilities. Mindfulness has been shown in numerous scientific studies to increase stress hardiness and increase the capacity to enjoy life. Mindfulness can be defined as intentionally bringing awareness, without judgment, to our moment to moment experiences. In this study group, we will explore the physiological, neurological and emotional impact of stress. In addition, we will engage in a variety of mindfulness-based meditation practices and related self-care skills. The content of this study is based upon the stress management program developed at the Center for Mindfulness at the University of Massachusetts Medical Center. Regular attendance is essential since the practice components build upon each other. Students should be prepared to engage in regular home practice during the term.

COPAIGUE, NY College Writing is a study in independent research and argumentative writing, designed to help the student acquire and practice the research and writing skills that will be most helpful for him/her in college and beyond. Our primary watchword will be inquiry, in the form of asking questions, conducting research, and keeping an open, questioning mind with respect to the issues we will investigate and discuss. The student will become familiar with the research resources available to him/her as well as how to evaluate and use these resources. We will engage in an ongoing discussion of a topic area of the student's choice, including a focus on the World Wide Web as a research tool and an object of critical analysis. Our discussions and readings (to be agreed upon by both student and mentor) will provide a starting point for the independent research project that the student will conduct. The instructor will provide instruction on constructing sound, well-reasoned arguments. Emphasis will be placed on the student presenting arguments, reasons, and research in a manner that persuades an audience. This study satisfies the SUNY general education requirement in Basic Communication. It also satisfies the infusion of both competencies, Critical Thinking and Information Management.

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This study is intended to help students further develop their advanced critical thinking skills. Students will learn to view, examine and write about film as a cultural, social and artistic expression.
