This study of counseling theories will give students the opportunity to compare 4 major schools of personality theory and therapy: psychoanalytic approaches, cognitive behavioral approaches, humanistic approaches and family therapies. Students will learn to identify how each approach makes different assumptions about what causes mental distress and mental health; how each approach conceptualizes the process of change clients; and how each approach structures treatment and the role of the counselor. Students will have ample opportunities to apply the concepts they are learning to case material so that they can begin to see the relative strengths and weaknesses of each approach and when it is best used. The student will also examine the ethical values and issues raised in working with these approaches.

Here is a chance to fulfill your Natural Sciences general education requirement from the comfort of your own home. This study will be conducted entirely online. What is free fall? How do sonograms work? What do compact discs and lasers have in common? How are microwave ovens and chemical bonds related? What is acid rain? How are Earth's motions and ice ages related? What causes earthquakes and tsunamis? You will be able to answer these everyday science questions and others while taking this online participatory study group. This study will provide a general survey of general science including chemistry, physics, astronomy and earth science. Participants in this study group will be able to use this knowledge of science to make informed decisions at work and at home. The group is intended for students whose concentrations are in areas other than science, but who desire a study such as this to support or add to their degree program plans. Some knowledge of first-level college mathematics would be useful, but this is primarily a study of basic science principles. Students will cover a range of topics including the laws of motion, simple machines, solar energy, lasers, the solar system, rocks and minerals, and chemical reactions. Students will read portions of a standard text in science, solve a selection of problems and exercises in each of the chapters covered, and submit their work via email to the instructor for review. Students will interact with other students and with the instructor using a dedicated web site set up by the instructor for discussions and questions on the material being covered. The web site will include study announcements, assignments and requirements, and responses to questions from the instructor and from other student participants. The instructor will contact students by email at the beginning of the term.

This study is done in a blended learning format. It will be a team-taught study with faculty from a diverse array of disciplines (i.e., business, human services, philosophy, and literature). We will meet 3 times as a study group and students will also be required to participate in online discussions and complete online assignments on the course website. The purpose of this format is to offer students a dynamic interactive environment that provides participants the opportunity to work and study in a social network style of learning setting with ongoing feedback being provided by the study instructors. Ethics are part of the fabric of life. In both our personal and professional lives, we are often confronted with ethical dilemmas—difficult decisions about the right thing to do. In this study group, we will explore some important contemporary ethical dilemmas and ethical modes of problem-solving from an interdisciplinary perspective. We will examine business, dilemmas, human service issues, social problems, and the methods used to generate informed solutions. Student will be introduced to the distinct methods of ethical reasoning found in each discipline. Specific issues from each discipline will be examined, and we will develop and analyze a body of research that examines current scholarship related to each problem. This study can be used as a substitution for Business Ethics and also to meet Human Service Ethics requirement.

If it has not already, the need to be an effective public speaker will almost certainly touch you sometime in your life. When it does, you want to be ready. The goal of this study group is to give the students practice in some of the typical speaking situations they might face in their personal and professional lives. Each student will present: 1) a personal introduction, 2) a dramatic reading, 3) a story about something they treasure, 4) a demonstration, 5) an informative speech using PowerPoint slides, and 6) a persuasive speech. In addition, the study group will discuss how to research topics, organize your ideas, and present yourself in a confident, professional manner. Are you not comfortable about speaking in public? One of the major concerns students have about any speech class is stage fright. In practice, most successful speakers are nervous before making a speech. By preparing and presenting the different speaking situations outlined above, you will have the opportunity to gain confidence and make your nervousness work for you rather than against you. Each speech will be videotaped and detailed feedback provided by the instructor and study mates.

It is well documented and accepted that addiction is a family disease. This study group will focus primarily on the dynamics in the family where addiction exists, and breaking the patterns developed to originally cope with life. Addiction to substances, including alcohol, are not exclusively the focus of family treatment. A person's behavioral addictions, such as shopping, food, pornography, gaming, gambling, and sex can influence family members to adapt a life coping strategy just to exist and survive. This may include patterns of low self-esteem, hopelessness, shame, defensiveness, and tuning out. These patterns continue to be practiced long after the family no longer lives together, and often interfere with healthy future relationships. This study group will identify common adaptations of family members of the addicted person, and outline the paths towards healthier living in relationships, with colleagues, and within the community.

Mental Illness in American Film 4 cr with Anna Bates
