Online Study Groups

British Literature: Selected Topics 4 cr with Maureen Kravec

Basic Communications - partially

In this study the student will read selected works of British literature in the context of its historical development. The primary text will be The Norton Anthology of British Literature, one volume edition. The student will supplement this text with other readings as individual interests develop. Each student will read the introduction to each section of the anthology. As a group, we will read and discuss Beowulf on the Moodle site. Each student will then choose three additional areas of focus from a list including, but not limited to, the following: traditional ballads; The Canterbury Tales; Renaissance literature -- selections form Shakespeare's contemporaries; John Milton, Puritans and Cavaliers; Dryden, Pope, and Neoclassicism; the birth of the novel; Romanticism; Victorians and pre-Raphaelites; and Modernism and stream of consciousness: Joyce, Woolf, and Eliot. Because of the quantity of material available, and because the goal is to familiarize the student with British literature from a historical perspective, it is likely that the study will focus on pre-Modern works. Topics should be chosen according to interest and to allow the student to explore topics new to him or her. Each student will write critical papers, each approximately 5 pages in length. At least 2 of the papers should incorporate material from sources in addition to the literature. Students will be expected to share their insights through answering questions and journaling in the Moodle site. This study meets the General Education requirement in Humanities OR Basic Communication, not both.

Business Ethics 4 cr with Barbara Rivera

This study is designed to facilitate an understanding of philosophies of ethics and ethical decision-making processes. The study emphasizes the overall philosophies, theories, and concepts of moral reasoning in making informed ethical decisions in various areas of business and business management. It satisfies the Business, Management and Economic Area of Study guidelines for Ethical and Social Responsibility. Prerequisites: Principles of Management or equivalent management knowledge. Advanced-level writing skills are required.

Conflict in Human Services 4 cr with Marie Pennucci

Students will explore theories and strategies for approaching conflict in the human services setting. Students will explore their own conflict and communication styles, assertiveness and aggressiveness in individuals and families and cross-cultural perspectives on conflict. Students will learn about mediation and negotiation and how these processes may support working with children, families and employees in an organization. The ability to assess and manage conflict is an important aspect of leading and managing both groups and organizations and will complement knowledge of human services management. Students will use Moodle to access and turn in assignments and participate in online discussions. As part of their final project, students are expected to choose a sub-topic area to research and post the information online to the group. The final paper is due at the end of the term.

Crisis Communication 4 cr with Barbara Rivera

This online group study will cover topics involving communication during crisis situations, within the framework of crisis management. Students will explore common practices and theories involving planning and preparing for crises, responding during a crisis, and evaluating actions following a crisis. Throughout the study, students will be asked to respond to readings and case studies in order to develop their knowledge of useful strategies in crisis communication. Advanced-level writing skills are required.

Electronic Commerce (E-Commerce) 4 cr with Barbara Rivera

This study focuses on how conventional business practices are changing as a result of the Internet and associated information technologies. Students will explore concepts relating to conducting business online and investigate the many complex issues that have emerged. The study will include topics such as online sales and marketing, business-to-business processes, social networking, legal issues, and security. Advanced-level writing skills are required.

Health Communication 4 cr with Barbara Rivera

This online study will examine the practical and theoretical aspects of health communication. Students will learn about common terms and concepts in health communication, as well as recent trends in this area. The process of planning health communications will also be explored. Advanced-level writing skills are required

Principles of Environmental Sustainability 4 cr with Mary O'Reilly

This is an interdisciplinary survey study designed to introduce some of the key concepts and thinking associated with environmental sustainability. Students will start with an introduction to systems thinking, which will provide students with the skills needed to analyze the complex interactions between human population, consumption, and the environment. Students will then learn how the biophysical world works, covering topics such as: natural laws; ecosystem organization and functions; material cycles; diversity and complexity; flexibility and adaptation; and short and long time scales. Students will then consider the effects on humans, and the biosphere, of human population dynamics, and human activities such as agriculture, fishing, extraction, manufacturing, transportation, building, and recreation. The study learning activities emphasize case studies, real-world problem-solving and critical thinking activities.

Students will engage in all phases of the writing process: pre-writing, drafting, revising, editing, and reflecting. They will learn to refine topics; develop and support ideas; investigate, evaluate, and incorporate appropriate resources; edit for effective style and usage; and determine appropriate approaches for a variety of contexts, audiences, and purposes. Students will critically evaluate selected readings in a variety of content areas and write essays and a research paper.
