

It is not necessary to take part I before part II of this study. This study will focus on the second half of the 20th century, beginning with the repositioning of the art world center from Paris to America, with Jackson Pollock. The course will include the aftermath of 1968 -- the Civil Rights movement, feminism, the Anti-War movement and other cultural shifts -- to usher in the "Age of Pluralism". The historical and theoretical issues of post-modernism will also be raised. This study will utilize both art exhibitions and museum collections in a variety of venues (either in person OR online). Students will read texts and articles, participate in online exchange with other students, report on museum and gallery exhibitions, and work on independent research projects stemming from the study of the art historical narrative. Students will need access to a computer. Prerequisite: recommended prior study of art, art appreciation, or another art history. This is not an introduction to art. This study meets the general education requirement for the Arts or the Humanities, NOT both.

Advanced Studio Practice 4 cr with Betty Wilde-Biasiny

Students will select a specific visual art form or medium at the advanced level. Students are expected to work on their studio projects independently and post examples of work, learn about the art field, and prepare artist statements to forward their ability to develop as a working artist. Each student will be expected to prepare a short proposal of learning goals at the beginning of the study. As an advanced study, students will be expected to engage in a cohesive project or body of work focused on individual statement making or identity, or from a theme developed by the student in consultation with the mentor. Learning activities will include on-line assignments and group critiques, in addition to targeted research of artists of inspiration or affinity, cultural groups of influence, and the student's own studio practice. Digital transmittal of work, written reflections on artistic process, and final digital presentation of the work are key components of this study. Journal articles and reviews will also be assigned as a way for the student to begin to locate their own studio practice within a contemporary context. The study will culminate with a power point or other web based presentation, along with a final reflective artist's statement.

This is an advanced level study of the history of American Art using the primary resources of various museums and/or websites as an exciting way to investigate, examine, and analyze art within the context of American history supported by the Moodle course template. The exhibition covers eight thematic areas—from pre-colonial to modern-- that will provide an reference the 350 years covered by this art historical designation of time and place. Students will work on four thematic papers that relate to four themes covered in this course. There will be an embedded writing component that is designed to strengthen critical thinking and writing skills; this simply means that students will at first submit drafts of papers, receive in-depth feedback, and be guided in their writing as a component of this art history study. The historical themes feature some revision of earlier art and cultural history by weaving a thread of diversity and inclusion into the course. An on-line course template will provide links to numerous museum resources and films. The study will include a regular submission of written assignments on the course template, embedded writing enrichment, and an opportunity to grow as a writer and scholar. Students will work on an independent research project in addition to the overall learning activities. The final module will consist of individual presentations and final papers by students on their research and visual findings. They will learn how to make PowerPoint slides or to expand on what they already know in terms of visual presentation.

Watercolor Painting is a mixed level visual art study that takes place at the Hudson Valley Center's Newburgh location. This hands-on study and will include several assignments on technique, purchase of all required materials, viewing of art and

response papers. Students should budget at least \$75.00 for watercolor pigments and papers and \$40.00 for the book. Please wait until you receive the list of supplies from the instructor. Workshop sessions will include demonstrations, examples of watercolor artists, working sessions, and critiques. Students taking the study on the advanced level will need strong drawing skills and/or some experience in the studio arts beyond the introductory level. Advanced students are expected to work at least 10 hours of work per week, outside of the studio sessions. Introductory students will be expected to work 8 hours per week and will have a different set of learning objectives and outcomes that focus more on technique and development. Advanced students will be expected to produce a discrete final portfolio of unified work; whereas introductory students will submit all of their assignments as the final project.
