Artifacts & Cultures of the Americas 4 cr with Rhianna Rogers 8 week

This study examines how objects, artifacts, and other forms of material culture -- from art work and clothing to jewelry and food-- become meaningful in culture across the Americas. Students will have the opportunity to experience the results of material exchange through hands-on practical projects dealing with New World artifacts, folklore, paintings, and historical documents. By the completion of this study, students will develop an understanding about the cultures of the Americas, the results of cultural exchanges, and the importance of material objects and items in this region in the world.

Biological Anthropology 4 cr with Nathan Whitley-Grassi 15 week

This study examines biological (or physical) anthropology, or the evolution of the human species and the nature of contemporary human variation. To establish a framework for the study of human evolutionary biology, principles of evolutionary theory, inheritance, population biology and genetics will be examined. As humans are classified within the Order Primates, we will also study the evolution, ecology, and behavior of our closest living relatives: prosimians, monkeys and apes. Fossil evidence for human evolution will then be considered through comparisons with non-human primate ecology and evolution to reconstruct prehistoric hominid evolution. Finally, we discuss modern human variation, paying particular attention how adaptation to environmental stressors like climate, nutrition, and disease have shaped our species - and continue to do so.

A vibrant workplace is created with diversity of opinions and approaches to performing duties. In this study, students will develop an overall framework for considering the nature of cultural, ethnic and gender and other diversity aspects in the work place. Should it be? Popular dissent has long been cast both as a form of civic betrayal and as a quintessentially "American" activity. In this study, we will explore the origins, rhetoric, production, psychology, and representation of political resistance. We will also examine the ways various protest movements have been appropriated from the margins and integrated into mainstream American culture. Readings will include selections by: Thomas Jefferson, Jacques Derrida, Thomas Paine, 19th c. Native American activists, Henry David Thoreau, Herman Melville, Harriet Beecher Stowe, Richard Wright, Martin Luther King, Jr. and Malcolm X. We will also look at: rap and hip-hop; the LGBT and women's rights movements; and contemporary protest movements. This study meets the SUNY general education requirements for the Humanities OR American History, not both.

This study will review Spanish 1 as it introduces the students to reflexive verbs; the present progressive; the preterit tense and the imperfect tense. The skills addressed in this study include listening, speaking, reading and writing. Students will gain a stronger basic level of comprehension and speaking ability through vocabulary, speaking and listening activities and discussions of grammatical structures being studied. Topics addressed in this study group include but are not limited to: verb conjugations, asking/answering questions, describing people and things, specific interrogatory sentences; expressing likes and dislikes, and specific vocabulary/phases, all in the above mentioned tenses. Cultural topics will also be introduced throughout the study. There will be regular unit test as well as a final presentation. When Europeans began to settle in North America in the 16th century, the continent was the homeland of many indigenous nations. This study is a survey of the history and art of first nations people from pre-Columbian times through phases of European encounter and colonization into the present day survival and revitalization of native culture in North America. In the process of learning about the history of North American indigenous people, this study will refute the popular belief that the Americas were a pristine and primitive wilderness prior to European contact while emphasizing the continuity of the indigenous presence. Group study meetings will include a review of discussion questions accompanied by visual images. A research paper is required in which a topic in indigenous arts is explored in terms of history, meaning and function. At the final meeting, students will share their research by presenting their topic to the group.

The purpose of this study is for the student to gain confidence writing for business and to cultivate a professional ethos. The student will develop strategies for planning, researching, drafting, revising, and editing business documents. The student will create several professional writings that consider various audiences, purposes and mediums [such as email, instant messaging, twitter etc]. He/she will practice the delivery of positive and negative messages. The student will identify career goals and create a professional resume and cover letter to meet those goals. He/she will explore use of the internet for job searching and for networking using social media [such as LinkedIn]. Additionally, the student will gain experience in research and reporting, by creating a presentation to inform, persuade and / or demonstrate with a choice to appeal to either an internal or external business audience.

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
